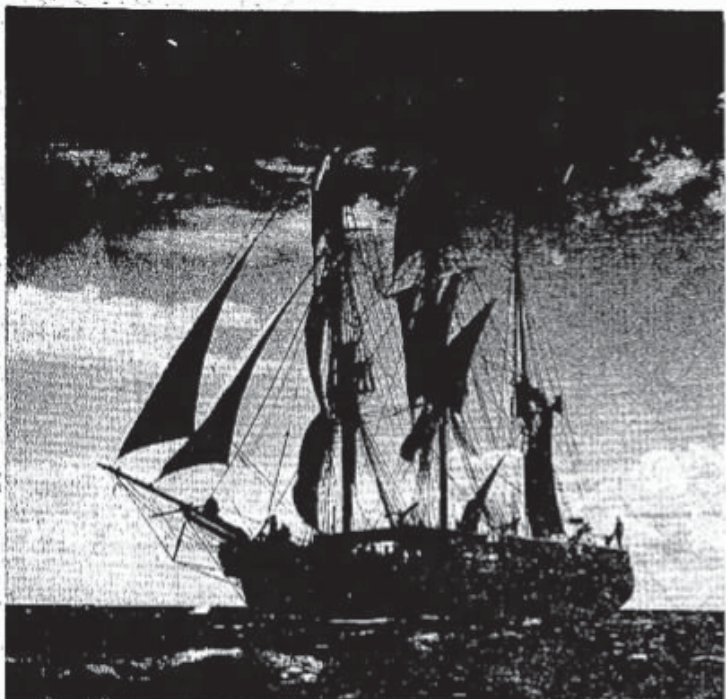

Ex-Monrovia Seeks Adventurers —With Money—to Sail to Tahiti

**Five Month
Trip to Cost
\$1,500 Each**

It might seem easy in paradise 20 men in sail away to Tahiti, but ex-Monrovia Tucker Thompson is having a little trouble.

There are a couple of catches. To his story, each of the 20 will be expected to work as a crewman on Thompson's square-rigged sailing ship for five months as they voyage to Tahiti, and each will be expected to pay about \$1,500 for the privilege of working in these magic waters.

Last Square Rigged

Thompson, who was born and raised in Monrovia before he ran away to sea, is the captain and owner of the bark "Corthaginian," which he describes as "the last of the square-rigged sailing ships now in active service."

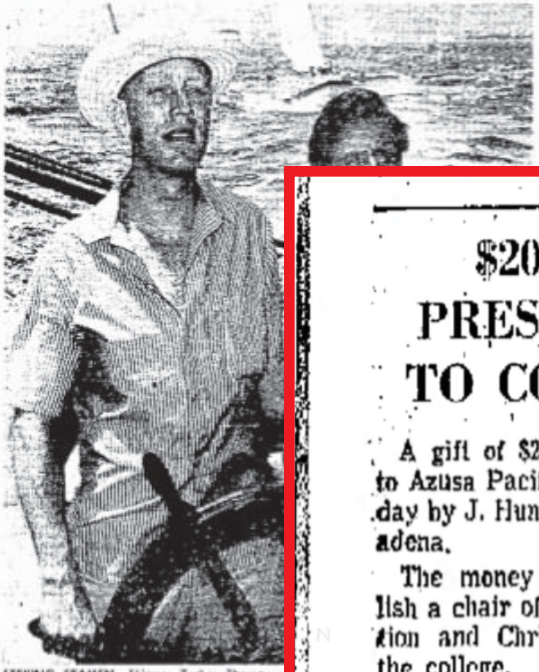
And this voyage, he says, will be "the last opportunity for a young man to experience sailing-in a square-rigged ship."

He and his family and his vessel are now berthed at the Sea Scout Base at 1001 W. Coast Highway in Newport Beach (area code 714, and 548-5022). Thompson is an ex-school teacher and father of three—two raised children whose school playground is the ship. His wife is the former Anita Croft, raised in Pasadena and Arcadia.

Sailing Museum

The "Corthaginian" has just finished a role in the movie "Hawaii." After this final voyage to Tahiti she will return to Hawaii to become a part of the Seaside Museum maintained by the city of La Hona on the island of Maui. But she will continue to sail around the islands, with Thompson as her skipper. Her museum voyage will be an active one, not a dishonorable retirement at dockside.

He hopes to start the Tahiti trip within the next two weeks, and he has recruited about 20 crewmen so far. All he needs is another 10 with a sense of adventure, a strong back, and \$1,500.

County Considers Balloting on Issue

Adequate Relief For Poor Sought

Voters may be called upon to cast ballots in deciding whether the Los Angeles County public defender's office, like that of the district attorney, should be elective rather than appointive, as suggested by the Independent Star-News.

The newspaper, in a recent series of articles indicated the need for better efficiency in the operation of the public defender's office as a means of providing adequate defense for accused indigent persons who are unable to employ private attorneys.

Board of Supervisor Warren M. Dorn announced Saturday that a committee report on the feasibility of making the public defender's office elective will be aired fully Tuesday at the board meeting.

It has been reported, he said, by the chief administrative officer's office, and the County Economy and Efficiency Committee.

Hollinger Researches Subject

"The chief administrative officer, L. S. Hollinger, has thoroughly researched the matter and has compared this county's public defender system with that of other counties throughout the state, determining what steps are necessary to place the subject on the ballot," the supervisor said.

Dorn also added that "committees of the Grand Jury are studying the matter."

Asked whether he has noted any change in the efficiency of the public defender's office since the publication of the series, Judge Arthur L. Abrams, presiding judge of the Superior Court criminal calendar replied:

"The situation has gotten worse."

He said, "Because of the recent United States Supreme Court decision in *Marras v. Arizona*, the situation has gotten worse. It places even a greater burden on a sadly undermanned public defender's staff."

The highest court decided in the *Marras* case that the police must advise an arrested person to arrange for the services of the public defender's office if he is too poor to hire his own attorney.

In the *Marras* case, Judge Abrams, sheriff and each police officer of his staff would be to assist any arrested person, because he is in a predicament of a few weeks ago, his limited staff had been cut in the county.

Maurice Block, Art Curator, Dies

Maurice Block, first curator of the art collections at the Henry E. Huntington Library and Art Gallery, died in Pasadena Friday night.

Mr. Block served as curator from 1928 until his retirement in 1958.

Born in 1887 in Gallion, Ohio, he was for several years assistant curator of decorative arts at the Art Institute of Chicago, and for four years on his teaching staff. He studied abroad and in New York, and for six years was director of the Art Institute of Omaha.

In 1928 he was appointed curator of the art collections at the Huntington Library in San Marino. His activities during his more than 20 years at the Huntington included curatorship of a brochure on Francois Boucher and the Rouvenet tapestries, and acquisition of a handbook of the art collections.

Mr. Block's name is associated with two major developments in the Art Gallery. The planning, decoration and arranging of the gallery where it is a "Blue Room," "Pavilion" and other famous picture hang, and the installation of the Georgian Room in the same building.

After his retirement from the Huntington, Mr. Block, who resided at 615 Woodgate St. in Pasadena, was actively interested in the State and County Arboreta in Arcadia, where he was in charge of the restoration of the historic "Queen Anne" cottages.

He is survived by a sister, Mrs. A. W. Bradford, of Galien, Ohio.

Arrangements for services, which will be conducted in Ohio, are being handled by Edwards Brothers Mercury, Los Angeles.

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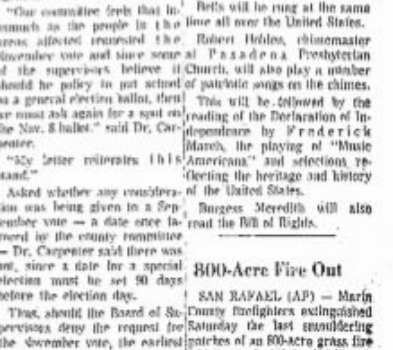
